## ***A-10s arrive at Selfridge***

The first six A-10 Thunderbolt jets arrived at Selfridge Air National Guard Base in December 2008. The jets, from the 110th Fighter Wing in Battle Creek, Mich., are the first of twenty-four “Warthogs” that are part of the 127th Wing’s new fighter aircraft mission. Many 107th Fighter Squadron pilots are already away at school learning to fly the new jet.

The 127th Maintenance Group begins its training in mid-January. Active duty airmen from the Field Training



Team will be training the Michigan Guardsmen through April in the maintenance of this larger (than F-16) attack plane.

“Everyone is looking forward to beginning this new mission. It’s exciting that we’re all starting from ground zero and will have these aircraft up and running in a matter of months,” stated Chief Master Sgt. Henry Ryan, 127th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron superintendent.

Newly qualified pilots of the 107th Fighter Squadron will be flying A-10s out of Baltimore, MD., until later this spring after an official ceremony marks the stand-up of the new fighter mission at Selfridge.

Happy 2009 to everyone at the 127th Wing! As with each of you, it's hard to imagine where 2008 went but when you look at the operations tempo of the unit, it becomes clear why it went by so fast. As with this past year, 2009 will be a banner year of conversion and inspection as we settle into our new missions. In this article I'd like to give each of you a flavor of where the wing is headed to as we embark on our 2009 journey -- here goes!

*Inspections-* In 2009, the wing will conduct 3 major inspections as we start preparation for a October 2010 AMC Nuclear Operational Readiness Inspection (NORI)/AMC Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI):

April 2009 - AFSOC Weather Flight Compliance Inspection (CI)

May 2009 (potentially October) - Joint Service Integrated Vulnerability Assessment (JSIVA)

November 2009 - AMC Unit Compliance Inspection (UCI) / Logistics Support Evaluation Program (LSEP)

*Exercises-* Exercises will continue to provide a baseline for improvement and in 2009 we have a full plate of exercises. Our major focus will be assisting the Air Refueling Group's preparation for both their UCI and follow on NORI/ORI in 2010:

February 2009 - AMC Table Top Nuclear Operational Readiness Exercise (NORE)

April 2009 - AMC Mini-NORE / Basewide Natural Disaster Exercise

July 2009 - AHRT Exercise

August 2009 -AMC NORE

September 2009 - AMC ORE at Alpena CRTC

October 2009 - Basewide TQT Rodeo Events / Tabletop CBRNE Exercise

*Conversion-* Although there will be distractions on the installation, the focus on the ACC side of the house will be the safe and efficient transition into the A-10 mission. Currently, due to a worldwide A-10 wing crack issue, we have consolidated flying in Baltimore Maryland with the Maryland and Arkansas A-10 ANG units and anticipate flying deployed operations there until the April/May 2009 timeframe.

January to April 2009 - ACC A-10 Maintenance Training Team at Selfridge / Deployed Flying Operations

*Major Deployments-* With the excellent progress the Air Refueling Group has made in their conversion from C-130s to the KC-135, we will embark on our first full rainbow KC-135 AEF operation in late Spring/early Summer. Our AFSOC Weather Flight members will also deploy to include a host of individual deployments around the world:

May to July 2009 - AMC AEF / July 2009 to Jan 2010 - AFSOC Deployment

# Base Announces Summer Air Show, Thunderbirds

Selfridge Air National Guard Base will host the USAF Thunderbirds and highlight military technology during its next Air Show and Open House scheduled for August 22 and 23, 2009, bringing together the people, aircraft, and military equipment from across service branches.

With a focus on the advancement of military technology, the base will exhibit displays from hybrid-vehicle technology to robotics to training simulators which have improved military operations to their current standards and fostered improvements in warfighter support. NASA has committed several displays to be set up in the field for participants to explore.

"We're very excited to be bringing back the Thunderbirds this year to an event that brings out so many hundreds of people in our community to see what we do right here at Selfridge," said Major Jim Rossi, the 2009 Air Show Director. The last time the Thunderbirds appeared at the base was 2003. "With a usual count of about 150,000 people for the event weekend, we expect this show to bring upwards of 200,000 people or more to the base to see what we do for our country on a daily basis."

The Air Show will showcase personnel and modern and future military aircraft and hardware that are currently contributing towards the global war on terror. Besides the Air Force's premier demonstration team, acts currently committed to the show include all aircraft stationed at Selfridge ANG Base such as the Air Guard's A-10 "Warthogs" and KC-135 "Stratotankers",

the Coast Guard's HH-65 "Dolphin" helicopters, the Army National Guard's CH-47 "Chinook" helicopters. Air Show favorites which have also committed include the MIG-17 "Fresco", T-1, F-104 Starfighters, T-6 Texans, B-25 Mitchell, C-47 - Skytrain, MIG-21 "Fishbed", Greg Poe (Fagen Oil) MX-2, Brett Hunter, Gene Soucy and Wingwalker, Mike Wiscus (Lucas Oil) Pitts, Oregon Aero Skydancer and Skywriter, and static displays of a variety of aircraft. Orange County Chopper has also signed on to participate. Aerial acts and static display aircraft and other equipment are still committing to the show and this list continues to grow.



## Last Michigan Air Guard F-16 flight

Michigan Air National Guard's 107th Fighter Squadron flew its last F-16 sortie on December 16 as the unit prepared to transition to the A-10 aircraft and mission.

The fighter jets will leave the base as weather cooperates early in January, flown by Indiana Air National Guardsmen to their new home at Ft. Wayne Air National Guard Base. Now, 24 A-10 aircraft will be assigned to the base.

Major Brian Davis, a pilot with the 107th Fighter Squadron, explains their new mission.

"The F-16 is a multipurpose aircraft. It can do many things. The A-10 is designed primarily for Close-Air Support. It was created to work and support the Soldiers and Marines on the ground. If that is the mission that needs to be done - and it is - then that's the mission we want to do."

The 127th Wing and its predecessor units in the Michigan Air National Guard have been flying "F" designated aircraft since 1950 when local Guardsmen began flying the F-84 Republic Thunderjet. Since then, the wing has flown the F-86, RF-84, F-89, F-100, RF-101, F-106, F-4 and F-16 aircraft.

The Michigan Air National Guard F-16s have flown in Operation Desert Storm, Operation Northern Watch, Operation Noble Eagle, and Operation Iraqi Freedom, being the first U.S. F-16 unit stationed inside Iraq in 2004 - instrumental to the Marine ground forces in the Fallujah battles that year.

Capt. David Wright, an intelligence officer with the unit, describes, "In 2004, our unit was assigned to Kirkuk, Iraq. It was unprecedented to bring F-16s into that austere environment. But we went in there and on the very first day, we had planes in the air. All the training, all the money spent to make sure that we were ready, all the work preparing - it all paid off. It was one of the most important things I have ever done in my life."

The 107th FS also deployed a second time in support of OIF

in 2007, performing a significant role in the battle of An Najaf in January of that year.

This transition is the last of the changes brought to the 127th Wing from the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure commission. Earlier in the year the wing converted its airlift mission of C-130s to the KC-135 Stratotanker refueling mission. The wing also stepped away from the Air Sovereignty Alert mission in October, preparing for the drawdown of the F-16s.

The 107th Fighter Squadron first took possession of an F-16 aircraft in late 1989. The squadron was certified mission-ready with the aircraft in early 1990. Prior to the upcoming transition mandated by the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure commission, Selfridge had 15 F-16 aircraft assigned.

## Weather Flight presented Outstanding Unit Award

Brig. Gen. Michael Peplinski, commander of the 127th Wing, presented the Air Force Outstanding Unit award to Lt. Col. Andrew Reeder, commander of the 107th Weather Flight during the December UTA. The 107th was selected as the Outstanding Unit in the Air National Guard for 2006.

Due the 107th's high operational tempo, a formal award ceremony before the entire unit was delayed. The 107th Weather Flight, a component of Air Force Special Operations Command, is an incredibly valuable military asset, said Army CW2 Michael W. Belcher, airdrop systems technician with the 20th Special Forces Group, who works with numerous paratroop units in the military. "They are the best there are. If they were second best, I'd tell you, but this unit sets the standard, bar none, across the entire U.S. military," Belcher said. In 2006, the 107th deployed twice, once each to Iraq and Afghanistan.

## Have a plan; don't delay

When will you die? It may seem like a morbid question, but the truth is you probably have no idea. If something happens to you, what will happen to your family? What will happen to your belongings? If you want any control over what happens to your dependents and possessions after you die, you need to create a plan while you are alive.

A family care plan includes powers of attorney, wills, and other aspects of your family's wellbeing. It is a necessity for every Guard member with dependents, and mandatory for those who are single parents or a dual military couple. SSgt. Steven Grady, 127 Wing Law Office Superintendent, stressed the importance of creating a plan and keeping it updated. "If you are seriously injured or killed, a family care plan will make sure that your final decisions are

carried out, and dependents are notified and financially covered," Grady said. When life changes, so should your plan; update it swiftly and accordingly.

For members without dependents, having a will and power of attorney is still essential. A power of attorney can take care of paperwork - like filing taxes - on your behalf in your absence. You can appoint multiple powers of attorney: for example, one can cover your finances and another can cover child care. Even if your only valuable belongings are an iPod and an X-Box, having a will ensures that you - not the state - will choose where they go when you go.

Remember the controversial Terri Schiavo case in 2005? Schiavo had been on life support for 15 years after collapsing in her Florida home. Her parents said that she would have wanted to remain on life support, while her husband said she would have wanted them to pull the plug. After several years of legal struggles, the

court ruled in favor of her husband, resulting in her death. If you were in Schiavo's position, what would you want your family to do? Don't make them guess: tell them in your will.

Creating a family care plan is a painless process. Filling out a will worksheet and paperwork for appointing a power of attorney takes about 20 minutes. You can accomplish this any time during UTA Saturdays and Sunday mornings in room 229 of Bldg. 303. Appointments may be scheduled for the official will signing process for the afternoon of UTA Sundays.

"A JAG representative will review your will, explain, and answer questions," Grady said. This process takes about an hour.

There is no excuse for being without a plan. If you choose not to practice your right to document your intent, you might disapprove of the actions the state takes for you in your absence.

### **Upcoming Honor Guard Training**

Application - See TSgt. Amanda Noble, 127 SVF, for an application and a commitment letter. Fill them out and have them signed by your supervisor, 1st Sgt. and Squadron Commander. Submit your application to the Honor Guard office located in building 164.

Interview - An interview will then be conducted with the Honor Guard NCOIC. After the interview, a decision will be made and you will be notified about your

selection or non-selection.

Commitment - Once you have been selected, you will be required to commit for one year and agree to participate in a minimum of 8 Honor Guard functions a year to the Selfridge Base Honor Guard.

Training - You will begin training with the Honor Guard at regularly scheduled training sessions which occur Friday night prior to drill weekend (6 per year are required).

Equipment Issue - Once a minimum level of proficiency has been met, you will be issued a complete Honor Guard uniform as well as any necessary equipment so that you can begin participating in Honor Guard ceremonies.

All personnel records (UPRGs) are going electronic. MPF's suspense date for completion of file preparation and shipping to appropriate location is March 13.


