AN INSIDE LOOK

Local teacher experiments in gravity, both on and off the planet

Colleen Cain, a Troy Schools' teacher, entered an exclusive club in the Michigan skies June 7, 2024, when she withstood nine "g's" during a backseat flight in an F-16 Fighting Falcon aircraft.

Cain was selected to participate in the Thunderbirds' "Hometown Heroes" program after being nominated as a selfless and inspirational community member.

The Thunderbirds flight took place the day before the 2024 Selfridge Open House and Air Show, and she received the full "flight crew" treatment. She was briefed, familiarized with flight equipment and emergency procedures, measured and fitted in a flight suit and after all that, she was taken to the skies.

Cain was nominated for the honorary flight after finishing third place in the 2023 National Air &

Space Forces Association's STEM Teacher of the Year. A seventh grade teacher from Larson Middle School, she's taught and inspired students for more than 18 years by way of her guiding values: collaboration, connection and community.

During the flight, the Thunderbird pilot slowly introduced her to the different g-force levels, until she successfully achieved nine "g's," allowing her to fly in formation during a practice flight.

Cain's other achievements include being accepted as one of 10 participants in the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium and ZERO-Gravity corporation partnership's "embedded teacher" program in 2023. In her class, she engages her students in tackling the global plastic waste issue. She's also led them to participate in the "Tomatosphere" program where they grew tomatoes from the International Space Station, investigating the impact of microgravity on plant growth.

Selfridge launches 'One-Stop' Educator Tours

In April, the 127th Wing launched its first "One-Stop" Educator Tour, providing about 20 counselors from Rochester Community Schools an inside look at what it's like to serve in today's military.

The participants toured maintenance areas, saw military aircraft and equipment, and spoke directly with the men and women in uniform who do the hard work at the base. The group also was briefed on the latest career opportunities and benefits available to those who serve.

With recruitment goals coming up short across the board, the military is seeking innovative ways to attract new volunteers.

"The concept of educator tours is nothing new," said Air Force Master Sgt. Brandon Hamm, recruiting office supervisor for the Michigan

Air National Guard at Selfridge. "The active-duty military has been hosting educator tours at their bases for years, but the National Guard component has never done anything like this before."

According to Hamm, one thing that makes the "One-Stop" Educator Tours at Selfridge so unique is that Selfridge is a joint service base, and they're able to feature opportunities with the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and the Coast Guard at a single location.

In the secondary counselor feedback, almost every participant found meeting with all the military branches extremely beneficial.

They also requested side-by-side information on each be made available for future reference.

Christopher Green, a counselor from Rochester High School said: "I loved hearing the stories of different people and why they joined. It

Painted a bigger picture than what you see when the recruiters come. I also enjoyed being on base to see things."

"We didn't realize the impact of the tour until we read the respondents' comments afterward," said Penelope Carroll, chief of public affairs for the 127th Wing. "The feedback was so positive, we knew we had to do more of these."

The staff is currently exploring ways to enhance the experience. We hope to offer the next tour after school starts, then hold them quarterly. The goal is to provide educators with a seamless, well-organized experience that will inform, inspire and maybe even dispel some rumors and myths about military service.
